Course Title:	Foundation Degree (FdA) in Costume for Theatre, TV and Film
Duration of Course:	Two years (Full-time).
Entry Requirements:	The University of the West of England's Standard Entry Requirements apply with the following additions/exceptions: Normal academic entry requirements would be General Art and Design Foundation Course or equivalent Level 3 qualification; or equivalent practical experience.
	Specific skills: competent sewing, well organised. Would normally demonstrate interest in areas such as film and theatre craft, and recreational sewing. Have a background in school / amateur theatre productions.
	For speakers of English as a second language an IELTS 7.0 (International English Language Testing System) is the minimum requirement with a minimum of 7.0 in each component of reading, writing, listening and speaking.
	Applicants will be interviewed by two members of staff, including the Head of Costume. Students are required to provide a portfolio with examples of their work. Applicants will be given an opportunity to ask questions of staff and current students where possible.
	All applicants are interviewed.
Course Outline:	You will find that this intensely practical and vocational two-year course will enable you to experience all the different aspects of the costume professionals role across stage and screen. You will be given the opportunity to learn a range of practical skills and applications to enable you to fulfil the various roles within the costume Industry, including assistant costume supervisor, costume supervisor and costume maker for both stage and screen.
	You will work to realise given designs. This may include sourcing costumes and fabrics, drafting patterns and making garments. All of the above follow safe working practices with relevant equipment.
	We aim to encourage a good flow of communication, work to deadlines and work towards independently producing items of costumes. All of the School's public productions will be staffed by the students, which number between 12 and 16 per year. Training is applicable to a wide range of employment in theatre, film and TV and is taught by School costume tutors and visiting industry professionals at Downside Rd and on location.
	You will work through the various costume roles building on experience within the School's live productions. All of these roles happen within the environment of a professional production under the guidance of the Costume tutors.
	All of the roles and skills that you encounter in your first year enable you to assess and consider your strengths and preferences as you move forward into your second year.

	Credit requirements 240 from the above specific Level 1 and Level 2 modules.
Method of <u>study</u> (for example, lectures, seminars, work placements) expected:	In line with Government regulations teaching and learning in the 2020 Summer Term at BOVTS was delivered online prompting a lot of innovative practice. In line with current Government regulations, it is anticipated that teaching and learning in 2020-21 will be a blend of online virtual learning (retaining the innovative practice developed in the 2020 Summer Term) and face to face learning. The exact mix will be kept under review as Government regulations change. You will find this intensely practical and vocational course will enable you
	to experience the costume professional role across stage and screen. You will be given the opportunity to learn a range of practical skills and applications to enable you to fulfil the role of Costume assistant and Costume supervisor in public productions and TV recordings. Within this role you will learn to develop the ability and confidence to lead and be part of a Production Team under the watchful eye of the Head of Costume.
	Core skills in construction techniques, pattern drafting and costume interpretation will be delivered through practical classes and workshops. Equipped with these essential skills students will work towards developing a critical problem-solving approach. The Costume FDA is embedded in a fundamental hands-on approach. The ethos is reflected in a high level of contact hours between students and staff and the variety of settings in which this takes place. You will focus on individual development but just as importantly come together on joint projects under professional guidance.
	Visiting Industry professionals will impart their knowledge through a series of workshops and lectures in their speciality. You will become familiar with specific tools required to enable you to progress through the various aspects of the roles covered. Industry placements provide the opportunity to further practical skills acquired in the course in a professional setting.
Workload including number of contact hours with School staff and expected self-study:	The learning is immersive with students taught and supervised by teaching staff at least 35 hours per week across the 68 weeks of the Course. Students are expected to undertake approximately 10 hours independent study per week.

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The overall methods of assessment for the Modules (for example exams, course work or practical assignments):	The assessment strategy for this course is appropriate for professional practice modules. This means that you will be assessed on your industry standard outputs such as embroidery and millinery samples (hat and patterns), before and after photographs of hair and make-up techniques plus show specific examples / rehearsals, samples of dyeing and breakdown techniques, production of Foundation Costumes, a comprehensive range of reference samples, accurately filled out measurement sheets, sets of paper pattern blocks, paper patterns, a blocked felt and straw hat and show-specific costumes. In terms of written assignments, you will be assessed on annotations of scripts, construction and maintenance of a continuity file, termly self-assessments and reflective placement reports amongst others. Students are assessed on their professional practice on a pass or fail basis. Judgements about students' performance are made against the relevant industry standards.
The award students will receive on successful completion of their Course:	Foundation Degree in Costume for Theatre, TV and Film, validated by UWE Bristol.
Where the Course is taught:	Operating at the School's Downside Road premises, on location and at Christchurch studios and normally in the major producing theatre venues in Bristol.
Length of the Modules:	Modules are delivered over the entire 34 week teaching year.
Staff who are delivering the teaching:	Head of Costume, Costume Tutor and visiting industry professionals.

Any extra costs (in addition to fees) which students may have to pay to complete the Course and estimated cost:	Increasingly much of the information and some of the content of the course is available via the School's virtual learning environment and so you will benefit from having access to your own personal computer and the internet to make the most of your course.
