
How to make a toilet ROLL RAT PUPPET



Step 1– First get a toilet roll and then either paint or cover it with paper that is the colour you would like your rat to be.



Step 2– Get a piece of paper or card cut it to the shape of an egg.





Step 3– Turn the egg shape upside down. Cut out circles to make the ears. Dap glue onto the circles and stick them to the head.



Step 4- Either find googley eyes or cut out bits of paper to create eyes. Glue them on to the face.







Step 5– Cut thin strips of paper to make the whiskers. Glue them on the bottom part of the head.



Step 6– Glue on a small ball on top of the whiskers to create nose.



Step 7- For the feet and hands get paper or card. Cut out four small rectangles with scissors and then with the scissors cut it to make the feet and the hands of the rat.



Step 8– Once all the pieces have been cut out you can start gluing the head onto the toilet roll. You can also glue on the hands and feet onto the toilet roll as well.



Step 9– The final step is to cut eithera 10cm length of string or a pipecleaner to create the tail of your rat.Glue it onto the back of the toilet roll.



Step 10– You have now finished your rat.

MAKING YOUR OWN RAT FINGER PUPPETS

(Cereal boxes could be perfect for this! Even more reason to eat your Weetabix in the morning!)



 Print out the shapes
(patterns in the pack). To make these finger puppets you can use paper, card, cereal boxes etc.



2. Cut out the triangles and fold edge flap. Glue the flap to the other side to create a cone.



3. Cut out the ears and the dotted triangle inside them. Bring these edges together and glue them. Fold the small flap and glue to the top of one cone.




4. Cut out the whiskers and attach to the cone.





5. Carefully cut out the tail and attach to the inside of the back of the cone.




6. Time to personalize your finger puppet! Draw on a nose and eyes of your choice! These could be drawn, fin foil or even beautiful beads.

HISTORY OF THE PIED PIPER

The story of the Pied Piper is perhaps the only fairytale based on truth. It dates back to the Middle Ages (possibly in 1284) from the town of Hamelin in Germany. Most of us have heard that there was a Pied Piper - a musician dressed in colourful clothing - who was also a rat catcher. The town asked him to lure away the filthy rats using his pipe, which was thought to be magic. The Piper played his pipe to lure the rats into the Weser river, where they all drowned. But when he returned to the town to collect his money as promised, the people refused to pay him. He got his revenge by playing the pipe again, but this time to persuade the children to go with him, as the rats had done before. Whilst the adults were in Church on the day of St Peter and St Paul (which is the 26th June) the piper played his magical pipe and all the children in the town followed him out of Hamelin, and into a cave, never to be seen again. It all sounds very spooky and magical but it's possible that something like that actually happened! There are many different theories of how and why, but it seems up to 130 children disappeared from the town of Hamelin in the 13th Century. We know this because there are accounts of a Stained Glass Window depicting the Pied Piper and the children that people wrote about at the time. Unfortunately, the church it was in was destroyed during the Second World War. There was also a ledger from the year 1384 which said "It is 100 years since our children vanished". Another clue is the street in Hamelin called Bungelosenstraße ("Drumless Street") where music has been banned for hundreds of years, for fear that something similar will happen again. Now, some of the theories suggest that the children disappeared due to an illness and that the Pied Piper might represent a sort-of Grim Reaper figure. The town wouldn't have wanted anyone from neighbouring towns to know that the children were sick because nobody would have come to trade with them, so they made up a story to cover it up.



Some say that this illness took the form of a Dancing Plague. This made people dance for hours and hours, and they followed the music out of town so as not to infect anyone else. There is also a theory that 'Locaters' came to the town to ask the young people to go and work in a land very far away in Eastern Europe, and that all the 'children' (the youth of the town) decided to leave Hamelin for a better life. Nobody knows exactly what happened, but it's fun trying to work it out and we have enjoyed exploring these theories in our updated version. What do you think happened? The weirdest thing is that the rats in the story were added later (in the 16th Century) and made popular by the Brothers Grimm (who you've probably heard of!)... besides, the rats wouldn't have drowned anyway as they're excellent swimmers!

Puppet designer Tish Mantripp and puppet maker Néamh Campbell worked closely together to design and create the big beautiful rat puppets that you see on screen!

The Puppets all started out life as designs and working drawings, which looked at how the puppets would look, move and be operated by the actors. A Computer CAD software was then used to look at the size and shape of the different moving parts. The body was then able to be created and put together, which included the carefully molded faces, created using worbla!









